

Press Release: Funding Bodies Launch Open Letter in Support of ORCID

December 6, 2018: ORCID is pleased to announce the launch of an <u>open letter in support of the use of ORCID identifiers</u> (iDs) in the grant application and reporting process.

Nine funding bodies around the world have signed the letter -- and are inviting others to join them -- to indicate their support for "the use of ORCID iDs in our grant application and/or reporting workflows and our commitment to implementing ORCID in accordance with best practice guidelines for funders."

The launch signatories also support the <u>ORBIT</u> (ORCID Reducing Burden and Improving Transparency) project, intended to develop and test practical uses of identifiers in funder grant management systems through a <u>Funder Working Group</u> and a series of pathfinder projects. These initiatives, which also involve the adoption and use of other identifiers, including for grants, organizations, and publications, will enable an open infrastructure that supports open research.
